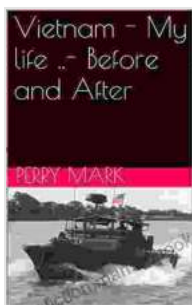


Vietnam: My Life Before and After

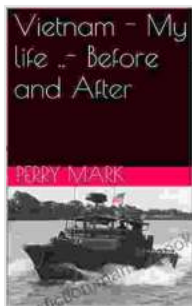
